On the panels in the galleries, you can find out even more exciting facts about nature then and now.





Grrr! I am the Great Bear. Can you find me on this globe? This is a celestial globe, and I am one of 50 constellations on it. The other globe depicts the Earth with its landmasses and oceans.

Together, the globes show what people used to know about the world. They believed that the universe was a large sphere with the Earth at its centre. You'd have to be huge to look at the starry sky from the outside like this!

SECRET CHARACTERS


Click clack, I am a crayfish. As Cancer,


Now you have seen many seasons.
